It is not the same as it used to be and also don't forget after thirty odd years you forget... if you don't use something, you don't really miss it after a while.

But I do listen sometimes.

Christine Music doesn't sound the same. Once again, your brain has to go on a learning

curve with music, I find it, listening to it - I mean I am 70, you listen to the Beatles songs, say, it doesn't sound quite the same. After a while I get the tune and I get the voices but it isn't quite the same, it's not perfect - but you

know, I can sing along quite happily.

Chris In respect of music. It's rather a complex story. All of the notes sound a bit

out of key, and that really is a matter of getting used to how the notes sound through the implant. In terms of singers that people are familiar with, if you take someone like Dolly Parton, Linda Rondstadt or EmmyLou Harris, they sound fine but are a bit out of key, and of course they're not out of key, it's

just the hearing!

Chris When I first started on music, I actually bought a video of *The Sound of Music* 

because there are a lot of sound tracks there which don't go too far in range and are quite enjoyable to watch. It helped, I think, as a start to appreciate

music.

Tayseer With the implant, music sounds quite natural. I usually listen to music all the

time and my wish is for more. When I'm coming back from work, when I am having just a break or something, listening to music's quite nice and I enjoy it. I picked up music straight away and it was quite natural for me from the

beginning.

I have always liked listening to music and it has been a joke in the house that I got stuck in the 80s because of how my hearing had developed - or deteriorated. Now I can hear lots of stuff much better. I can now pick up a song after a couple of lines, instead of waiting for the chorus or the best verse I know so, yes, it is great to rediscover it. But as I said before - with my voice, it is hard to hear me singing it!
